2025 Program Highlights

In 2025, we provided critical services and programs that made a meaningful difference in our community:

- Hotline: Answered 692 crisis calls, providing immediate support and resources.
- Counseling: Provided over 498 hours of trauma-informed counseling sessions to 244 survivors.
- Accompaniment: Supported 259 survivors through hospital exams, police reports, and court proceedings.
- Crisis Intervention: Assisted 143 survivors with immediate crisis support and safety planning.
- S.A.R.T. Accompaniment: Provided accompaniment services for 29 survivors during Sexual Assault Response Team exams.
- Advocacy: Collaborated on legislation to strengthen survivor rights and improve access to justice.



Flexible Financial Assistance

In 2025, we expanded our flexible financial assistance program to meet the urgent needs of survivors and their families.

We distributed over \$126,400 in direct assistance to more than 300 clients, covering essential needs such as:

Education & Outreach | 2025 Impact Overview

In 2025, our team led robust community education and outreach efforts focused on violence prevention, public awareness, and connection to critical support services. These initiatives reached communities across Imperial County and were thoughtfully extended to include unincorporated and rural areas such as Palo Verde, Ocotillo, Salton Sea, Bombay Beach, Desert Shores, Seeley, Slab City, Winterhaven, and Niland, ensuring that individuals in even the most remote and underserved regions had access to the support, care, and resources they deserve.

We delivered a variety of SA/DV programs, including interactive presentations, resource fairs, wellness events, parenting classes, and support groups for individuals across all life stages from children and youth to adults and seniors.

We proudly conducted 588 outreach events, reaching a total of 30,502 participants. Our outreach was inclusive and intentional, engaging diverse and often underserved populations such as LGBTQ+ individuals, unhoused community members, farmworkers, seniors, and immigrants in detention centers.

These efforts not only expanded access to resources but also fostered greater awareness, community empowerment, and early intervention, key steps in breaking the cycle of violence and building a safer, more informed community.

Activity: Community Outreach

Sector: Seniors Attendees: 7,040 Description:

Outreach efforts for seniors focused on raising awareness about elder abuse, personal safety, mental health, and available support services. Programs were designed to be accessible, respectful, and culturally sensitive, helping older adults feel informed, empowered, and connected to resources that support their independence and well-being.

Activity: Community Outreach

Sector: Farmworkers Attendees: 8,737 Description:

Outreach efforts provided farmworkers with critical information on violence prevention, access to support services, and legal rights. Programs were delivered in culturally and linguistically appropriate formats, ensuring accessibility and promoting safety, empowerment, and well-being among a historically underserved population.

Activity: Community Outreach Prevention Education

Sector: Youths
Attendees: 1,701
Description:

Educational outreach for youth focused on increasing awareness of sexual assault, dating violence, and healthy relationship dynamics. Through age-appropriate, trauma-informed presentations and discussions, young participants were empowered to recognize warning signs, understand consent, set boundaries, and access support services when needed. These sessions helped foster a culture of respect, safety, and prevention among adolescents and teens.



2025 Highlights: Community Engagement & Impact

Annual Summer Resource Fair IV Mall

For the past five consecutive years, the Sure Helpline Center has proudly hosted the Annual Summer Resource Fair at the IV Mall. This well-attended event brings together more than fifteen partner agencies—including Imperial County Behavioral Health Services, Líderes Campesinas, Imperial Valley Food Bank, Planned Parenthood, WomenHaven, Employment Development Department (EDD), Center of Employment Training (CET), Calexico Wellness Center, and Innercare—to provide vital information and education to our community. This collaborative effort plays a crucial role in expanding access to support services, empowering residents with resources that address their diverse needs.

Homeless Breakfast Event

Since 2021, the Sure Helpline Center has organized the annual Homeless Breakfast Event each November in the parking lot of our main office. This compassionate gathering offers critical information and referral services related to domestic violence and sexual assault for individuals experiencing homelessness. Over six local agencies participate regularly, including Innercare, Alcoholics Anonymous, Al-Anon, Imperial County Behavioral Health Services (ICBH), Imperial County Public Health Department, Imperial Valley Food Bank, and Brown Bag Coalition, providing a broad spectrum of resources tailored to this vulnerable population. Attendees receive food, clothing, blankets, socks, personal hygiene items, and vaccines, alongside complimentary breakfast, snacks, hot coffee, and water. This event exemplifies our commitment to promoting dignity, respect, and equality across all communities.

Walk a Mile Event

As Imperial County's only rape crisis center, the Sure Helpline Center organizes the annual "Walk a Mile in Their Shoes" event to stand in solidarity with survivors of sexual assault. This heartfelt demonstration raises awareness and fosters community understanding of the challenges faced by survivors. Participants—including representatives from the Sheriff's Department, Imperial Valley College, firefighters, the District Attorney's Office, Victim Witness Office, WomenHaven, high school students, and concerned community members—walk together wearing red high heels and carrying signs advocating against sexual violence. This powerful, symbolic march promotes survivor support and underscores the importance of education, unity, and collective action in creating a safer community for all.


